The Millinocket Marathon attracts hundreds of tourists every year; why can't better bike infrastructure do the same? Better bike infrastructure would attract a more significant demographic of tourists to Millinocket, and more people would buy from Millinocket businesses. The addition of bike lanes would keep bikers safe, but at what cost? The bike lanes in Millinocket would better segregate bikers and cars and pedestrians. Taxpayers would pay a minimal amount for bike lanes since federal grants could be a way to pay for bike lanes.

Some may argue that Millinocket has good bike infrastructure, with the addition of the Michaud Trail and trails behind Stearns High School. WAR CRIMES

Ukraine - Who wins in war? Death, destruction, civilizations lost, identities destroyed, cultures erased. Nobody wins. The people of Ukraine have been killed and displaced for no other reason than they would like to be free. Freedom is something we take for granted as American citizens.

According to CNN's April 6, 2022, live updates, "the UN agency has recorded 3,776 civilian casualties in Ukraine: 1,563 killed and 2,213 injured in its latest update posted Wednesday" (2022). The report also stated, "in Kyiv, at least 89 people had been killed, including four children, and 167 homes damaged since the beginning of the Russian invasion, Kyiv City State Administration wrote in a statement on a verified Telegram page on Wednesday. Another 398 people, including 20 children, were injured in the war" (Liakos, Egan, Collins, Krebs, Cassidy, Liptak, and Voitovych, 2022). We must ask ourselves, "What about the rules of war?' In their June 28, 2022 discussion, NPR defined "the rules of war as part of the Geneva Convention. They were first established in the 19th century and dictated what could and could not be done during armed conflict. They aim to protect people who are not fighting in the conflict and curb the brutality of war by setting limits on the weapons and tactics employed" (2022).

So why are these established rules so blatantly being disregarded? Scott Paul, the humanitarian policy leader of Oxfam America, a global agency, stated, "It has become glaringly obvious that respect for international

humanitarian law is in decline" (2018). This was before the Ukraine war. The UN General Assembly adopted the Declaration of Human Rights in 1948. According to the UN, "it was the first legal document to set out the fundamental human rights to be universally protected"(nd).

The United Nations website states that the UDHR, which turned 70 in 2018, continues to be the foundation of all international human rights law (nd). The "UDHR contains 30 articles established to provide the principles and

building blocks of current and future human rights conventions, treaties, and other legal instruments" (nd). The problem with the UDHR is that enforcing the rules can be difficult. This is mainly due to the distribution of veto power. The five veto-holding permanent members of the Security Council are the U.S., **China**, **Russia**, the U.K., and France must vote unanimously to pursue a "resolution that might call for an investigation, refer a case to a court for trial, threaten sanctions or propose another motion" (Universal Declaration of Human Rights). The fight for human rights lies in the hands of two countries known for their human rights violations so that the atrocities will continue.
